ALLANDALE STATION: HURON-WENDAT ANCESTORS DUG UP AND DESECRATED IN BARRIE, ONTARIO

Following the publication of APTN stories on the burial site and the discovery of remains of Huron-Wendat ancestors which have been dug up, disturbed, and entirely desecrated, likely with the knowledge of certain municipal and government authorities, on the Allandale Station site in the city of Barrie, Ontario (Wendake South), the Grand Chief of the Huron-Wendat Nation, Mr. Konrad Sioui, has declared that this situation is unacceptable and is being taken very seriously. The Grand Chief has met with the Mayor of Barrie, Mr. Jeff Lehman, on April 5, 2016 and has asked the concerned authorities to take immediate steps to address these serious breaches and find satisfactory solutions in these circumstances, in accordance with their obligations to the Nation and in respect for the Huron-Wendat ancestors. The Huron-Wendat Nation has also formally requested that an independent investigation be urgently set up in order to shed light on the issue. The Mayor of Barrie agreed to the request and the terms of this investigation have been proposed by the Huron-wendat Nation.

"We deeply lament this immense desecration of our ancestors. The Allandale Station site and the burial grounds that are found there are sacred and must be protected. Huron-Wendat human remains must never be disturbed, under any circumstances. The Huron-Wendat Nation reminded the concerned authorities that they have legal obligations, including constitutional duties to our Nation, which

have been completely ignored. These transgressions must be corrected. We are outraged to see that this situation seems to have gone on for years, all without our knowledge. Both in the Wendake North (the Nionwentsïo, including the Saint Lawrence Valley in Quebec), in the Wendake South (the Great Lakes of Ontario, Erie and Huron), we have been faced with many situations where the remains of our ancestors have been unearthed, examined, studied, unilaterally appropriated or simply disposed of like garbage. As in all such cases, this situation is unacceptable to us", said Grand Chief Sioui.

In June 2015, the Huron-Wendat Nation's council adopted a resolution to establish a clear position regarding the protection and preservation of its ancestral heritage. "We will continue to fight for the protection of our history and against the destruction of our heritage and ancestors both in Quebec and in

Ontario. These are our ancestors and we will take all the necessary measures to restore their dignity so that they may rest in peace", concluded the Grand Chief.v

PHASE II OF THE HURON-WENDAT COMMUNITY SERVICE STATION

Following the success of the first phase and the overall profitability of the gas station in recent years, phase II can now be initiated. The plans and specifications are ready and the calls for tenders were launched based on our policy related to granting contracts to promote local em-ployment and entrepreneurship, thereby enabling our business people to develop our own ser-vices.

Construction is underway and will continue through the weeks of the construction holiday in July. As the work continues, we ask for your cooperation and appreciate your understanding for the inconveniences associated with the construction project.

A process to hire a Huron-Wendat manager responsible for operating the service station will be initiated shortly in order to provide convenience store services including a coffee and pastries counter, bulk candy, sales of alcohol (beer and wine) and lottery tickets as well as convenience store products.

"Our gas station is receiving a facelift. Given Wendake's demographic increase in recent years following the closure of Ms. Paul's reserve convenience store, a need to provide our community gas station with this type of service was identified and the profits will be used to improve oth-er services that are greatly needed while generating jobs for our members. We expect to dou-ble the current number of gas station employees", said Grand Chief Konrad Sioui.

of tax-free goods for members of the Huron-Wendat Nation and other First Nations will also be offered during the same business hours as the service station. For a low price that will be communicated shortly to the public, our members will be able to have their goods that are purchased off-reserve delivered directly to the service station, thereby allowing them to benefit from their tax exemption rights on these goods. The service will allow users to have their goods delivered on site and then retrieve them during normal business hours.

WENDAKE SPORTS COMPLEX

Good news! The Wendake sports complex project is now considered an economic development project according to the criteria of government funding agencies. Indeed, the Economic Development sector announced this fact to the Conseil de la Nation huronne-wendat in response to various representations which clearly demonstrated that the sports complex will not be a sim-ple community infrastructure, but rather a genuine driving force for the economic development of the Huron-Wendat Nation. This eligibility will allow the Council to seek additional sources of funding which will allow it to develop a financial arrangement and a viable financial structure for this important community project.

Last spring, the Economic Development sector also confirmed financial assistance in the amount of \$185 475 from the federal government in order to complete the design for the fu-ture sports complex. Architects are currently at work and the plans and specifications should be completed this summer. The preparation of the plans and specifications constitutes the final step to complete the business plan for the project before it can be submitted to the various funding agencies so that we can receive confirmation regarding their participation in the pro-ject. The sports complex represents a total investment of about \$6.5 million. Meanwhile, discussions are underway with interest groups to reach ice time agreements.

«Our documents are well designed, our team of professionals has credibility and our analyses are solid and confirm the demand for ice time in the region. The construction of the sports complex will launch the development of our eastern Wendake land. We also want to develop a tax-free commercial area for the benefit of our members and to take advantage of the captive Aboriginal market living in the National Capital region. In short, we are working on positive projects that will create jobs for the Nation», stated Grand Chief Konrad Sioui.

The planned sports complex should include a rink, six players' rooms, a room for female play-ers, three bathrooms, bleachers for approximately 300 spectators, a shop (pro shop), a food counter and a multipurpose room for 300 people for hosting events (receptions, weddings, pub-lic meetings, etc.). This room could also be used for sports purposes (yoga, various sports, off-ice training, etc.). A large parking lot will be developed and additional site development work will be carried out.

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A POOL AT THE HÔTEL-MUSÉE


Since opening in 2008, the Hôtel-Musée Premières Nations has had to overcome many challenges before reaching the threshold of profitability. Following sustained efforts from many dedicated people including employees of the tourism industry and members of the board of directors consisting mainly of Huron-Wendat people, the hotel has achieved profitability in the last two fiscal years thereby allowing it to access the Aboriginal Business Development Program (ABDP) under the innovation and growth components. It is in this context that the tourism industry in Wendake prepared last fall a pool project for the Hôtel-Musée and received a federal grant to conduct the various feasibility studies as well as the plans and specifications for the swimming pool.

The pool will allow for improving our existing range of tourism services in order to attract a family, leisure and travel clientele which is currently not being accommodated enough by the hotel. The plans and specifications have now been completed and the federal government confirmed its participation in the project through a non-reimbursable financial grant in the amount of \$250 000 and the Secrétariat

aux affaires autochtones (SAA) is also being asked for a contribution in the amount of \$200 000.

«Following very positive shows of support from the ministries, we obtained a significant grant from Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada and we should be able to receive a significant amount from the provincial government as well. This money will be used for specific infrastructure projects for economic development purposes. We therefore took advantage of the opportunity to improve our range of tourism services to attract a very large family clientele to facilitate the profitability of our industry. This project will ensure the hotel's sustainability while generating additional revenue. Of course, the pool will be used by both seniors and youth and it will be managed based on a community-based approach to meet the needs according to a schedule that will be developed. If all goes as planned, construction could begin during the summer of 2016», said Vice-Grand Chief Jean Vincent who is responsible for the tourism industry.

PHASE II OF WENDAKE'S ARTISTIC HUB

Recently, you have probably seen the new digital billboard that was set up in the parking lot of the artistic hub located at 100 Bastien boulevard.

The establishment of this billboard completes the first phase of the artistic hub project which consisted of relocating our local community radio station 100.3 FM CIHW to the artistic hub while adding a cabaret, the 1760-Bistro. This billboard therefore aims to promote the activities of the artistic hub, increase the visibility of our artists and advertise cultural and community events within the Huron-Wendat Nation.

Packages combining the use of the billboard with community radio station air time are also a possibility. Priority and a discount will be given to business people of the Huron-Wendat Nation and an additional discount will be given to members of Tourisme Wendake.

All advertising revenues will support the operations of the community radio station in order to give it a permanent structure that will allow it to take flight.

In addition, the second phase of the artistic hub project also involves building a «dance circle» on the site. In recent years, the CNHW has noted a growing demand for traditional gatherings and community activities. The current site of the artistic hub, in addition to having a great location, offers a wide range of activities where a natural landscape and vegetation are omnipresent. However, the land is not being used to its full potential since there is currently no permanent infrastructure for holding major cultural gatherings and pow wow activities in an environment where artists are close to Mother Earth.



Therefore, in order to overcome this problem, the CNHW will be renovating the outdoor stage of the amphitheatre and building a «dance circle» on the site in order to accommodate traditional activities. This project is funded by the Secrétariat aux affaires autochtones and work is ongoing.

Now that the radio station is ready for new programming, its transformation process has begun. On June 21, 2016 which is National Aboriginal Day, the programming will be unveiled featuring enhanced Aboriginal content in order to comply with the conditions of the Aboriginal community radio license granted by the CRTC.

"The content will foster participation and our members will be called upon to participate more in order to promote our artists who will be performing at the 1760-Bistro. Our artists now have a forum and can participate in its content. All revenue generated by the artistic hub will be used to finance the radio station's activities. Within a window of 12 to 24 months, we expect it to be working at full capacity", said Chief Jean-Philippe Sioui who is responsible for economic development.

A VISIT FROM MPS GÉRARD DELTELL AND TONY CLEMENT IN WENDAKE

On March 29, 2016, Wendake received a visit from Conservative MPs Gérard Deltell and Tony Clement. For the occasion, they went on a complete tour of the community and the main priorities of the Huron-Wendat Nation were discussed.

"I had discussed with Gérard Deltell the possibility of a visit from Prime Minister Stephen Harper in Wendake, but after the electoral defeat of the Conservative Party in October 2015, things changed.

However, Gérard facilitated a visit from Tony Clement, the current MP for Parry Sound-Muskoka in Ontario who was a senior minister in the Harper government. Mr. Clement wanted to visit Wendake. We visited our institutions as well as the tourism. historical and economic sectors. We also visited Prémontex, which manufactures components for stairs and is the largest manufacturer in Canada. He was also impressed to see that many non-Aboriginal people work here in Wendake. We also brought him to visit the lands of eastern Wendake and informed him regarding the construction of our sports complex and a future tax-free commercial area and discussed our territory, the Nionwentsïo, as well as our national Treaty. Mr. Clement was impressed with our vitality, our strength and our self-determination and he understood that our

Nation has a very important role to play in the region and even beyond", said Grand Chief Konrad Sioui.

Even though Wendake is a bustling and active community in terms of its development, the Huron-Wendat Nation must be able to rely on the budgets needed to strengthen its infrastructure and services.

"We asked Mr. Clement to be an agent of support for our Nation and he does not object to the more generous policies of the Liberal government that reinforce the funding of our institutions in all areas. He confirmed his party's commitment in this regard. I believe that we made an ally and that people who are part of the opposition also have influence. They can lend us a helping hand", said the Grand Chief.

POSITION OF THE HURON-WENDAT NATION REGARDING THE MANY ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS ORGANIZED BY COMMUNITY COALITIONS THAT HAVE BEEN ORGANIZED IN RECENT WEEKS IN MANY INNU COMMUNITIES TO DENOUNCE THE MODERN PETAPAN DRAFT TREATY

First of all, the Huron-Wendat Nation would like to congratulate our brothers and sisters from oth-er communities who are aware of the importance of defending their rights and are actively participating in this important debate which essentially aims to ensure that the best decisions are made for the well-being of the seven future generations.


Regarding the many requests for support that we have received from these coalitions that have formed in the various Innu communities, it was decided that the Huron-Wendat Nation would not intervene directly in this debate which is not its own to debate: whether or not it is in favour of an Innu treaty. We firmly believe that the men and women who make up the great Innu Nation will take the necessary steps related to their own development and collective fulfillment.

In recent years, under our leadership, the Huron-Wendat Nation has always respected the freedom of choice of the Innu, at least for the three communities that are still at the table (Mashteuiatsh, Es-sipit and Nutashkuan) to continue their negotiations with governments in order to sign a modern settlement agreement which is so desired by their political representatives. However, as we have already expressed in the past, if members of the Innu communities want to sign a modern treaty with the Crown, and by extension allow the termination or suspension of their Aboriginal title to their ancestral land in exchange for various promises and financial compensation, then so be it, but the rule of law, which is so important in a country like Canada, requires that our ancestral territory, the Nionwentsïo, be excluded from this agreement. Our traditional territory will not be sold, leased or

loaned. Mother Earth cannot be sold or alienated, because after the sale comes excessive regulation, taxation, assimilation and control. These types of approaches, which are often taken based on greed at the expense of those most in need, generally only benefit a chosen few that are more or less insensitive to the future generations.

In December 2014, in the context of a procedure initiated by the Huron-Wendat Nation to defend its territorial integrity, the Federal Court of Canada recognized that the federal Crown, the trustee, had violated its obligations by signing the agreement in principle (APGN) with three Innu communities, which provides a reminder that, too often in Canadian history, governments have used our own brothers and sisters in order to better divide and conquer. It is important to keep in mind that if the Crown was able to breach its obligations to the Huron-Wendat Nation, nothing can guarantee to other Aboriginal Nations, including the Innu, that they will not be forced to suffer the same fate. It is important to remember that it is this same government that is negotiating the terms of an Innu treaty with three communities out of nine, the same trustee that nonetheless continues to make drastic cuts to our health care and education system as well as our efforts related to the fight against addiction in all its forms in addition to poverty and suicide. Can the government's word be trusted? After a career dedicated to advocating for our rights and having won battles which now benefit all of our First Nations, I believe that it is a recognized fact that, in Canada, it is not the political parties or the federal and provincial governments that have advanced the Aboriginal cause, but rather recourse to the various courts, particularly the Supreme Court of Canada.

With respect to promises from these governments, I still subscribe to the school of thought that says we have to advocate vigilance, learn to surround ourselves with the best resources, listen to and make room for our youth who today are much more trained and prepared than we were at their age and, most importantly, work together, develop unifying strategies, be forwardthinking and insightful, protect our hardearned assets and earn more. Since the defence of our rights and our territories is central to our values, we must make ourselves the greatest defenders of the environ-ment, natural



resources, plants and wildlife. At the heart of this renewed unity, through our actions and the positions we take, we will forge alliances and get our Quebec and Canadian neighbours to join us in our efforts and the more people we can get to gather around this big circle, the more people will come to realize that money cannot buy our convictions or break our identity. We are the First Nations of Canada!

A SUCCESSFUL HUNT WITH TWO INNU CHIEFS

On April 24, 2016, Grand Chief Konrad Sioui, the Chief of the Innu community of Pakua shipi, Denis Mesténapéo, and the Chief of the Innu community of Unamen Shipu, Alain Lalo, spent a wonderful weekend goose hunting in Batiscan.

«Denis and Alain are outstanding goose hunters; they were making the geese dance in the sky! They are friends and allies and I am happy to have had the opportunity to spend a great day with them on the Nionwentsïo», said Grand Chief Sioui.

ADDITION OF 146 ACRES OF RESERVE LAND TO WENDAKE

A message from Grand Chief Konrad Sioui

I am very proud to inform you that the land transfer file for lots located in Wendake East is finally completed following a process that began in 2011.

It is thanks to the approval of the members of the Huron-Wendat Nation, during a referendum that was held on October 29, 2010, that we were able to purchase the contiguous land. Indeed, this process authorized the Council to withdraw an amount

of \$11.7 million from the Forty Acres (Quarante Arpents) agreement. Previously, only the interest from this account could be accessed.

However, it was essential to take action in this land addition file in order to substantially expand our territory. Your elected officials have worked in the best interests of the Nation to ensure its sustainability.

MODERNIZATION PLAN OF THE CNHW

In a spirit of sound management of public funds and financial transparency and in order to ensure the sustainability of the Nation, the Conseil de la Nation huronne-wendat (CNHW) conducted in the last year a strategic planning exercise that allowed it to identify its priorities and objectives for 2015 to 2020.

Some very revealing findings emerged regarding the future of our public administration. One of the highlights, which is also a cause for some concern, is the aging of the employees since 24% of them are over 55 years of age and likely to proceed with a well-deserved retirement in the short-term.

To overcome this eventuality, the CNHW has introduced a VOLUNTARY departure program that will allow eligible employees to be offered a fair departure premium and privileged access to their pensions.

For each VOLUNTARILY accepted departure, the CNHW will ensure knowledge transfer and establish a succession and training plan respecting its hiring policy and favouring a Huron-Wendat workforce.

No position will be abolished unless an employee indicates that they are interested in a VOLUNTARY departure in compensation for a premium, and only after an assessment has been conducted by the program's management regarding the need to retain the position and maintain the services for the members.

Obviously, this measure implies a short-term cost but the CNHW is able to reassure the population that savings will be made in the medium-term.

Grand Chief Konrad Sioui would like to provide reassurance that all decisions made by the elected officials are made in the best interests of the Nation. This mentality guides their actions.







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!!! TO ALL USERS OF THE LAND !!!

The Nionwentsïo Office is requesting support from the Huron-Wendat people in order to gather information regarding the movements of the Charlevoix caribou population. We would like to get the

precise location (GPS coordinates) of each individual caribou observed in addition to photographs (royalty free). This information will allow us to track the population according to the seasons and thus better protect it.

Indeed, the Nionwentsïo Office has been actively working in recent years to safeguard the cari-bou population using different actions. Observations from members of the Huron-Wendat Na-tion could allow us to evaluate, in part, the positive impacts of our projects. A giant map of the hunting zones was displayed to allow the hunters to see the available zones.

Chief René Gros-Louis addressed those in attendance to discuss with them the calendar for the hunting weeks in the Laurentides wildlife reserve, the Portneuf wildlife reserve and the Tourilli sector. He also reviewed the rules of the code of ethics for the hunters.

The dates of the 2016 moose hunting weeks are as follows: September 23rd to 29th, Sep-tember 30th to October 6th and October 7th to 13th.

OUR VERSION OF HISTORY PRESENTED BY DR.

GEORGES SIOUI

At the Hôtel-Musée Premières Nations on April 26, 2016, a lecture was provided by Dr. Georges Sioui, specialist on the history of Aboriginal peoples in Canada. This one-day meeting was an opportunity for approximately thirty participants (chiefs, directors, CNHW employees, legal ad-visors and other human resources related to our historical research processes) to learn about the historical, legal and political aspects that were covered by Dr. Sioui.Dr. Georges Sioui has pubished three outstanding books on Native American history and philos-ophy: Pour une histoire amérindienne de l'Amérique (For a Native American history of America) (1999), Huron-Wendat, une civilisation méconnue

(Huron-Wendat, an unknown civilization) (1999) and Histoire de Kanatha vues et racontées (History of Kanatha seen and told) (2008). He also taught native studies in several universities in Canada and the United States. He was the Dean of Education at the Saskatchewan Indian Federated College in Regina (1993–1997) and the President of the Institute of Indigenous Government in Vancouver (1999–2000). In 2003, Georges Sioui became Head of Research for the Indian Claims Commission in Ottawa. From 2004 to 2012, he was the coordinator of the Aboriginal Studies Program at the University of Ottawa. He is a full professor and is devoted to teaching and writing.

"This day particularly served to inspire us and offset a historiography that is far too often bi-ased and "westernized". We are committed to providing a version of history that is revised and adapted to facts, rights and historical realities that are upto-date. For example, our culture, history and oral tradition, which are unique to our Nation, remind us that we have always oc-cupied both northern Wendake (St. Lawrence valley) and southern Wendake (Great Lakes re-gion) and that we are the direct descendants of the Stadakonians. This telling of our history first of all aims to reach the members of the Huron-Wendat Nation and, secondly, to dissemi-nate this information to the non-Aboriginal public in general including the populations of Quebec, Canada and other populations as well as governments, development project promoters and other various types of partners," said Grand Chief Konrad Sioui.

in order to fund Dreams Take Flight, a non-profit organization that allows underprivileged children to take part in a one-day trip to Walt Disney World in Florida.

"Our challenge is the only cycling event that travels the road between Montreal and Quebec in a single day. We are now on our 11th edition and we are very proud to have awarded more than \$100 000 for the 2015 edition. Our financial support for this organization is the main reason for our commitment.

In 10 years, the cycling challenge has awarded more than \$515 000 to Dreams Take Flight and, thanks to this money, we have given 1800 children the opportunity to experience a dream day", said André Perkins.

So far, Ms. Nathalie Chantal, member of the Huron-Wendat Nation, has accepted to take on the cycling challenge with André and approximately fifty other cyclists on August 20th.

What is Dreams Take Flight?

It is a non-profit organization comprised of the Air Canada family in Canada and the United States. Colleagues and friends work together in order to give children the opportunity to experience a "dream day" at Disney World in Florida. It is a fantastic and magical trip that will forever physically, mentally and socially mark the lives of a group of disadvantaged children. Each year, about 175 children in the regions of Montreal and Quebec get the chance to experience magical moments on this wonderful day full of emotions.

This year, the trip will be held on November 2nd. We leave with the children the day before and sleep in Montreal. Basically, the children must be between the ages of 7 and 11 years and the trip is for socially, mentally or physically disadvantaged children. Last year, two children participated and they really enjoyed it. These youth were transformed by their experience", said Mr. Guy Duchesneau, Assistant Director of Social Services.








ANDRÉ DU SAULT, GOVERNOR OF THE HARVARD CLUB OF QUEBEC

In 2015, Wendake's Columbarium was established in order to meet a need that was identified by our members which bears the Nation's architectural signature and colours. Mr. Oney Maher, funeral counsellor for Memorial Wendake, is available to answer your questions and guide you in your funeral arrangements. We are aware that this is not a pleasant process to perform. Nonetheless, it is recommended to make your own deci-sions.

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Currently, over 25% of the alcoves have been sold. Note that each alcove can hold two urns and the price is established on a per alcove basis rather than per urn unlike many places. It is important to note that only members of the Huron-Wendat Nation have the right to acquire an alcove. However, it is possible for non-Aboriginal spouses to share the same alcove.

We encourage you to meet with Mr. Oney Maher to learn about the services offered by Memorial Wendake. He will meet with you in the presbytery in a quiet and peaceful lo-cation.

Furthermore, we have reached agreements with funeral homes in order to perform fu-neral preplanning and arrangements directly from here. We want to support families in the funeral process and provide them with the best support we can in this difficult time. Each case is unique and you are encouraged to contact Mr. Maher for more information including the various payment options that are available to you.


DESROCHES, Denise

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




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
